Currently Ben serves on the school's discipline committee, is the faculty advisor for the multicultural association on campus, coaches squash and lacrosse, and teaches sections of English III and AP Language and Composition.



Introduction to

Critical Reading and Writing

Master teacher: Mr. Stephen Farrell

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Session 1

In this short course, meeting 3 times per week for 2 weeks, we will focus on learning to read literature critically and to write critical essays, skills that are essential for students considering studying in the United States. Using **American short stories**, we will develop our skills **interpreting literature** and learning to see the **multiple levels of well written works**.

A commitment to improving one's reading and writing skills is essential to fully benefit from this course. Students will be required to always have their cameras on and to participate in class every day.

Session 2

In this short course, meeting 3 times per week for 2 weeks, we will focus on learning to read literature critically and to write critical essays. Using American short stories and a well-known **Arthur Miller play**, we will develop our skills **interpreting literature** and learning to see the **multiple levels of well written works**.

A commitment to improving one's reading and writing skills is essential to fully benefit from this course. Students will be required to always have their cameras on and to participate in class every day. Enrollment is not contingent on completion of Session 1. Session 2 uses new reading materials.

Students will also be introduced to the basics of critical writing:

- how to introduce a topic;
- how to develop a clear and comprehensive thesis that will shape the body paragraphs;
- how to prove one's thesis in the body paragraphs with strong topic sentences and appropriate textual evidence;
- and how to write a conclusion that does more than repeat the thesis.



Great American Playwrights:

Literature & Drama Studies

Master teacher: Mr. Paul Tines

Students are introduced to the American canon of playwrights. The playwrights studied have significantly contributed to the culture of the American theater through their depictions of the American Dream, shaping the American theater as we know it today. The class will find connections between the playwrights, discuss cultural issues, and identify recurring themes and metaphors in American drama. Starting with Our Town and concluding with The Laramie Project, students will read, discuss themes, analyze, and study the politics and arts of each period.

Students will explore and consider: What is the role of the playwright in society? What are the artistic goals of the playwright? How are the goals of the playwright similar to other writers? How do playwrights use dialogue, action, and situation? How does the playwright keep the audience engaged? The play is a unique writing form. How does the playwright work? How does the playwright use dialogue in revealing information about the characters?

This is not a lecture class, but rather an engagement with the mind of each individual student – active participation is expected. To be successful in navigating the course, students will have to read each play before class. Students will share their writing assignments and exercises, such as creating new scenes and monologues for the plays studied, reading scenes aloud, and researching the politics and art forms of each period. Discussion questions will be provided before each class.

For students considering American boarding schools, the plays studied in this course will figure prominently in English, art, and theater courses in these schools. This course will help strengthen and support further study in boarding schools.

Screen Acting

Master teacher: Mr. Paul Tines

Students interested in acting who want to further mature and develop their skills will benefit from this course. The emphasis is on scene work, character analysis, voice and movement, as well as the introduction of classical and contemporary plays. Students will work on duo scenes with presentations, investigating the Stanislavsky, Adler, and Meisner acting techniques. Students will also explore an awareness and control of their emotions as they create characters in scenes from Brighton Beach Memoirs, Our Town, A Midsummer Night's Dream, and Rabbit Hole. Evaluation is based on class participation, performance, and fulfillment of assignments. The final class culminates with showcasing scenes for parents, friends, and ARCH. Students will be expected to rehearse assigned scenes outside of class with their scene partners.

The actress Meryl Streep once said, "Acting is not about being someone different. It's finding the similarity in what is apparently different, then finding myself in there." Acting for both the stage and the screen can be rewarding. With practice and patience, actors can easily switch between the techniques required from each environment.

- Acting supports success in the workplace with teamwork, presentation skills, work ethics, self-discipline, and the ability to work under pressure.

Confidently Comedic: Interview Prep

Interview Prep Skills and Beyond Through Improv

Master teacher: Mr. Ben Morgan

Did you know that improv comedy has been shown to reduce anxiety and can increase confidence and presence?

In this course, students will learn the basics of improv comedy to unleash their confidence on boarding school interviews and in social settings. In the first two sessions of the course, students will learn improv fundamentals while participating in a variety of improv exercises to help them tap into their performance abilities. We will reflect on takeaways after each exercise to draw out these important skills. In the final session, we will take those skills and apply them directly to how to interview with more poise and spirit for boarding schools.

Students will grow in their interpersonal presence in a way that will benefit them beyond the interview process as well, for when they arrive at school. In addition to students who are considering applying to boarding school, this is a great course for students that are still finding their footing socially after all disruptions of the pandemic over the last two years.
